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A. Mission

Growing Food. Growing Minds. Together. The purpose of the Troy Garden Camp is to provide a fun, safe environment for kids to learn about stewarding the land and their health through growing, cooking, and eating fresh food right in the garden. Children will have opportunities to explore the winding trails of the tall-grass prairie, build forts in the sugar maple woodland, and observe a working CSA farm.

Troy Garden Camp will be a sub-program of the Troy Kids' Garden (TKG). Any revenue earned will off-set our regular Kids' Garden program, which is entirely funded on small annual grants. The TKG program is offered at nominal rates for community centers/school programs.

B. Licensing

Troy Garden Camp will not be licensed for 2017. A camp that limits attendance to children over the age of 7 is exempt from needing a license. A license is required when there are 4 or more children under the age of 7 in care at one time.

We do intend to be licensed in the future, so when possible, we will develop our systems to be in compliance.
